Sunday in the Library

Tired of cold and snow? For a wonderful change, plan to join us for the first Rosendale *Sunday in the Library* on March 7th at 2 PM. Sponsored by the Friends of the Rosendale Library, under the Book in a Bag program through the Mid Hudson Library System, the highly praised Kathryn Stockett novel *The Help* will be discussed. Featured on the Today Show's "Ten Must Read Books for spring," and praised by the Associated Press as "At turns hilarious and heart-wrenching...[A] pitch-perfect rendering. Readers are hooked." *The Help* is a must read.



Set in Jackson, Mississippi in 1962, this novel uses the voices and experiences of three women to explore the social, political and moral issues of the segregated south. Skeeter, a young white woman who has just returned home after graduating from Ole Miss, convinces Abilene and Minnie, two black maids, to join her in telling the complex stories of the relationships between the maids, their mistresses and their children. The tension caused by the personal and political changes of that era is captured by the author and engages readers with this authentic and deeply moving story.

Kathryn Stockett creates three extraordinary women whose determination to start a movement of their own forever changes a town, and the way women--mothers, daughters, caregivers, friends--view one another. A deeply moving novel filled with poignancy, humor, and hope, *The Help* is a timeless and universal story about the lines we abide by, and the ones we don't.

Join us and bring your ideas and thoughts to the discussion of these three ordinary women as they take one extraordinary step. Come to the first *Sunday in the Library* on March 7th (snow date March 14th). Copies of *The Help* can be picked up at the library. The plan is divided into three sections with items that will be addressed during the time of the plan.

Materials and Equipment

- Increase bestsellers, fiction, mysteries
- Increase non-fiction and local history
- Increase DVD collection
- Replace computers and upgrade software

Programs and Services

- Provide three special children's programs per year
- Provide three special adult programs per year
- Provide three special local history programs per year
- Develop three adult reading and discussion groups per year
- Develop email newsletter
- Add more weekend hours and/or some earlier weekday hours

Facility

- Address parking lot situation, paint lines for more effective use of space
- Address mold problem in the basement
- Replace old windows
- Light the Rose window
- Find additional space, either by building or renting

While the five year plan is complete, the board welcomes ongoing suggestions from the community.

From the Desk of **Robert Sena, President,** *Library Board of Trustees*

Greetings from the Library Board. The library had a very good year in 2009. We completed the roof project and we now have a new slate roof that will hopefully last another 132 years. In the spring we will be working on several projects that will enhance the overall environment of the Library even more. The parking lot was somewhat damaged due to passage of the heavy equipment needed to deliver and raise the pallets of slate to the roof. We intend to resurface and line the parking lot with one space specifically set aside for handicapped parking.

The Library, as with many structures in the village, is prone to getting water in the basement. This, in turn, has led to an increase of mold in the basement. We are going to undertake a trenching project around part of the library that will allow for better drainage of water away from the foundation and end leakage into the basement. Once this is done we will then take action to eliminate or at least alleviate the mold problem.

In November 2008, the Library completed a full audit. As a result of this report and its recommendations, we updated and streamlined our banking and accounting procedures. Our monthly financial statements now provide more information in a more readable form.

The Library completed its registration process with the State Education Dept. in late 2009. We have received our registration certificate which will be prominently displayed in the library.

The Library Board is composed of nine members who volunteer to serve, but must also be elected for a four year term. The size of the Board and the length of the term is set forth in the Legislation that formed the Special Library District over 20 years ago. At present there are two vacancies on the Board due to resignations over the past several months. Anyone interested in serving on the Board should pick up an application form at the library. You are invited to attend one or more monthly meetings before you make a final decision. The Board meets on the third Wed. of every month at 7:30(Sept.-May) or 7:00(June-Aug). Once accepted the new member must stand for election on the day of the budget vote (early Sept.). Hopefully, some in the community will consider service on the Board.

**“The American Revolution:
Iroquois Indian Perspectives”**

March 10

With Distinguished Professor Laurence M. Hauptman, Speaker, NY Council for the Humanities

The Iroquois Indians refer to the American Revolution as the “whirlwind” in their oral tradition. The Six Nations (Mohawk, Oneida, Onondaga, Cayuga, Seneca, and Tuscarora) were dramatically affected by the war and its consequences. These native peoples found themselves pulled by both the Patriot and British sides. This slide presentation presents the war from diverse perspectives and makes use of the rich oral traditions and archival research gathered by the lecturer over the past 35 years.

Cougar Recovery in Eastern
North America”**

Cougar, mountain lion, panther, painter, catamount. The search for this elusive cat is one of the great riddles in North American natural history. Despite thousands of sightings, only a dozen confirmations have emerged east of Chicago during the last generation. While using remote camera surveys in New Jersey and at Minnewaska

State Park, Chris came to surprising conclusions regarding the state of our forests, its inhabitants, and how restorations of this magnificent predator are imperative for the recovery of declining eastern woodlands.

Library Funding Slashed at the State Level

The following is excerpted from comments of Bernard A. Margolis, New York State Librarian and Assistant Commissioner for Libraries

In an unprecedented chain of events the New York State Legislature approved a plan to cut library funding for a fourth time in 20 months, at a level deeper than the Governor had proposed. In previous years the legislature has fought against cuts to libraries proposed by this Governor and past Governors, either reducing a cut or eliminating it all together, but not this time.

Legislators have cut libraries by 12.5%, an additional 2.5% deeper than Governor Paterson proposed, despite record increases in library usage, especially among the unemployed using library resources to look for jobs or research new careers, **This most recent round of cuts brings Library Aid down to 1998 levels and results in a ~\$40,000 cut to Mid Hudson Library System in the last month of our fiscal year.**

Needless to say, 2009 has been a tough year and 2010 will certainly be a challenging year for libraries and library programs. Can we look for any good news amidst the budget cuts library? The good news is that the economic downturn has accelerated the already existing trend of increased library use. Public library circulation in New York increased by 9 million to 155.8 million and public library visits increased by 4.3 million to 117.2 million in 2008 and both are expected to continue to rise dramatically in 2009 and 2010. The bad news of course is that many libraries and library systems across the nation are

facing decreased government support. Despite the tough times, through cooperation and collaboration, the New York State Library and our library system across the state accomplished a great deal in 2009.

Facing tighter budgets, the library community continues to do more with less. Together, we have again met or exceeded many of our goals and have much for which we are proud. Patrons need to take action now and continue to do so into 2010 when libraries will undoubtedly face more cuts. **Here's what you can do right now to make a difference:**
